### Strong Performance

- Government of Rwanda has ensured tenure security for rural populations. Land titling is common and land markets function well. Policy promotes equitable access to common property resources.
- The Government encourages varied agricultural research and extension services, and local farmer organisations are involved in setting policy priorities. The extension system is effective and properly reaches out to poor farmers. Government policies, strategies and mechanisms seek to ensure gender equity in access to extension services.
- Relative to other HANCI countries, Rwanda's medium/long term national development policy (The Economic Development and Poverty Reduction Strategy) assigns strong importance to nutrition.
- Rwanda instituted a separate budget line for nutrition, enabling transparency and accountability for spending.
- The National Nutrition Policy/Strategy identifies time bound nutrition targets and a multisectoral and multistakeholder policy coordination mechanism has been set up.
- Policymakers in Rwanda benefit from regular nutrition surveys that are statistically representative at national level. The last survey was published in 2014-2015.
- The Government of Rwanda promotes complementary feeding practices and has achieved two high doses of vitamin A supplementation for 95% of children in 2014.
- In Rwanda 99% of women aged 15-49 were visited at least once during pregnancy by skilled health personnel in 2015.




### Areas for improvement


- Spending on agriculture (9.06% of public spending in 2014) is close to, yet not fully meeting government commitments set out in the African Union's Maputo Declaration (10% of public spending).
- Rwanda's spending in its health sector (9.9% of public spending in 2014) does not fully meet (15%) commitments set out in the Abuja Declaration.
- In Rwanda, the law gives women and men equal economic rights and equal legal access to agricultural land. However, these laws are not effectively enforced and discriminatory practices against women continue, increasing their vulnerability to hunger and undernutrition.
- Weak access to improved sanitation facilities (61.6% in 2015) obstructs better hunger and nutrition outcomes.
- In Rwanda, constitutional protection of the right to food and the right to social security is weak.
- Civil registration rates are weak (63.2% in 2010) and potentially hold back children's access to critical public services such as health and education.
